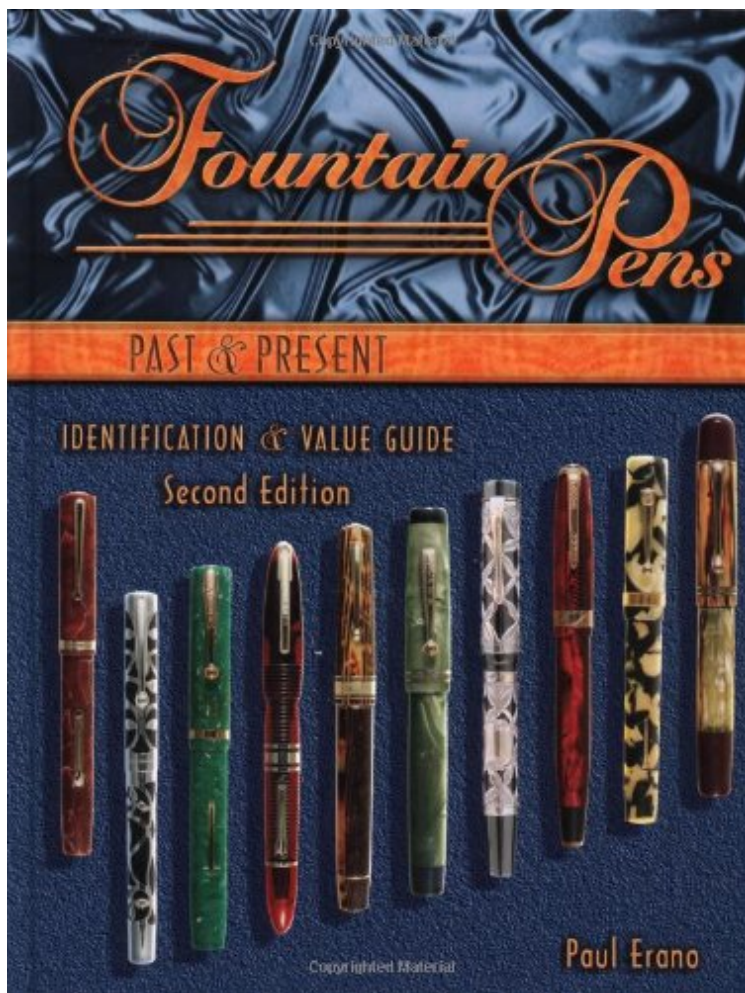

It has quality photographs and moderately good descriptions, but does not cover that much or has so many examples (enough to know there is a lot to be covered, thought).As a price guide, forget it. Every price guide gets dated quickly, but this one seemed off the mark from the day I got it. In addition, there are new sections on individual artisans and their unique creations and a revised section on contemporary manufacturers, double the size of the first edition.
