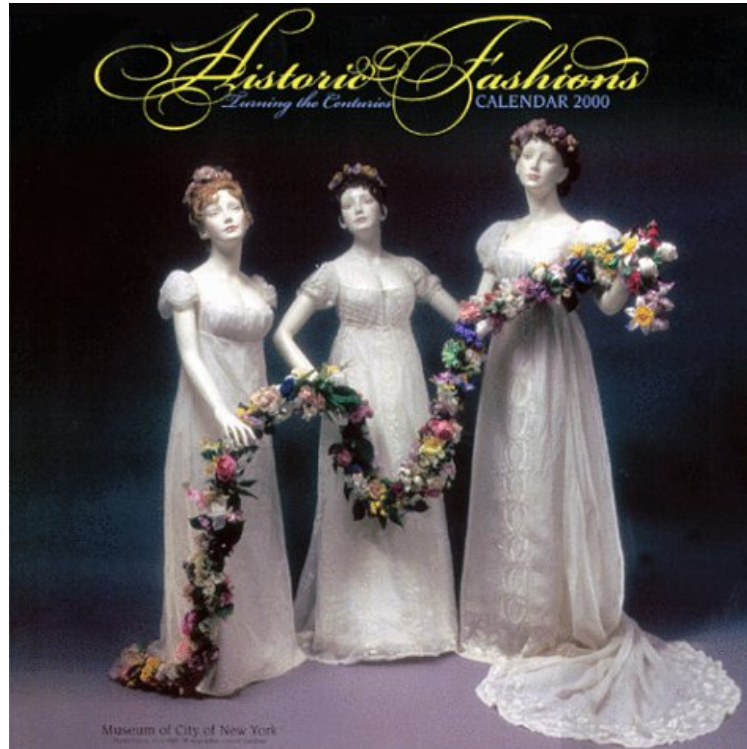

The main emphasis of this calendar is not so much on dress, however, as on the museums from which the featured items of clothing were selected. A different museum is showcased each month along with several items from it's collection. Information on how to contact each museum is also listed, including web addresses. Featured institutions include: Royal Ontario Museum, Old Sturbridge Village, Missouri Historical Association, Hillwood Museum and Gardens, Old State House, DAR Museum, Nevada State Museum and Goldstein Museum of Design.0 of 0 people found the following review helpful.
