The European St. Nick dispensed charity to the poor, but the American version gave toys to good children

everywhere. Spending---especially on children---was not a display of sinful excess but a demonstration of the Christmas spirit itself. Germany became the toy-making capital of the world... Marvelous as the German toys were, importation costs kept them relatively expensive---until retailer Frank Woolworth taught the German toy-makers to mass-produce goods and ship them to his warehouses for packaging and distribution... countless children had merry Christmases because Woolworth's stores featured products that almost every family could afford."
